


INMEMORIAM



Leonard F. Knobbs, age 84, passed away on December 17, 2020 after a brief battle with COVID. Born in Philadelphia, Len was the son of the late Leonard D. Knobbs and the late Mabel Hood Knobbs, the devoted husband of Barbara J. Zegarski Knobbs for sixty-five years, the loving father of Leonard F. Knobbs, Jr. (Mary), Raymond "Bear" Knobbs (Lauren), Barbara Macready (Andrew), Stephen "Cubby" Knobbs (Cindi), the late Robert Knobbs, Kathleen Coleman (Steven), and Michael Knobbs (Angel), the proud grandfather of 23 grandchildren, 42 great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild, and the beloved brother of Margaret Mudrick (Walter) and the late Sister Catherine Knobbs, SSJ.

Born on January 20, 1936, Len was raised in the Port Richmond section of Philadelphia. He was a proud graduate of St. Anne Grade School (Class of 1949) and Northeast Catholic High School (Class of 1953). In 1955, he married the love of his life, Barbara. They resided in St. Martin of Tours Parish and raised their seven children there. He enjoyed traveling with his "bride", taking photographs of his large family, and sharing memories with his loved ones.

In 1956, Len entered the Philadelphia Fire Department and quickly moved up the ranks. In 1982, he retired as a Battalion Chief after 26 years of service. The next twenty years, he spent with Police & Fire Medical Enterprises, Inc. where he served as Executive Vice President and CFO prior to his retirement. He attended Penn's Wharton Evening School; subsequently, he attended courses sponsored by the International Foundation of Employee Benefit Programs and the American Management Association and was a member of both organizations.

He was a charter member of the Chief Financial Officers' Association and a past president of the Eastern Pennsylvania Administrators Association.

Len was a proud and devoted member of Northeast Catholic Alumni Association. He was elected to the Board of Governors in 1956 and since has chaired or served on every committee of the Association.

At the 2007 Communion Breakfast, he was presented with a plaque for fifty years of service to the Association. In 1978, Len was named an Outstanding Alumnus, and in 1979, was one of fifty men honored by the Association on the occasion of the Association's fiftieth anniversary celebration.

In 1991, Len was inducted into the NECHS Hall of Fame.

You naturally stepped up when the need arose to temporarily "help out" our Executive Secretary when he was nursing a broken collarbone, That temporary status started in 1994 and continued until 2021.

John R. Hanejko, '65 started out on the Board of Governors, participating on or was

the head of many different committees and then achieved the lofty post of President in 1986 until 1989 and once again in 2009 to 2012. That is 6 terms as President. If I'm not mistaken, John has devoted 5 decades plus of his life to the Northeast Catholic family. John, unfortunately, was our leader when the Archdiocese closed down our beloved school. Rest assured folks the broken hearted President worked tirelessly to find an alternative to closing North 10 years ago, but unfortunately the people downtown had their minds made up to shutter our doors. BUT...... John immediately went to work, along with his office mate Len and our Class Representatives, to shape our Association into the envy of every high school alumni association that ever was, including most colleges and universities. I receive letters and compliments on our camaraderie, our uniqueness, our faithfulness to God and the Catholic Church and the Oblates, and most especially our generosity. Yes, John was and is a big part of us receiving these accolades. He was not home watching Seinfeld reruns or Jeopardy at night. No, he was over at the "Office" when it was down at Erie and Torresdale, or 2700 Rhawn Street at least 4 nights a week. And if we were doing mailings John would be there lending support likely 6 days a week.

John's humble beginnings in the Port Richmond neighborhood included his education at Our Lady Help of Christians grade school for 8 years and then to Northeast Catholic graduating in 1965. After graduating from North Catholic John joined the Philadelphia Police Department where he rose to the rank of Chief Inspector. John retired from the Police Department after 40 years of dedicated service. I can not tell you how many Philly Cops I run into that tell me what a good guy John was and how he is still very respected.

John also was lucky to have found an extremely nice and understanding bride, Joyce, and they have a very close extended family of children and grandchildren who accepted John's dedication to his family, work and the Alumni Association. Knowing that John will continue to support the alumni efforts moving forward I am sure he will also begin to find the time to study the literary works of Roger Bacon aka "Dr. Mirabillis" the Franciscan philosopher. He has been meaning to do a 21st century interpretation of the 1267 classic "Opus Tertium" and get the schools to adopt the good doctors teachings. We will be glad to report on Mr. Hanejko's progress in future publications.

John, it is the little things you did for us that mean so much.

Dear Brother Falcons,

I have news to report in this President's Message. I am talking about the passing of the person responsible for doing more for this Association and our school than arguably anyone. I am writing about my friend Len Knobbs, '53. Over the years I've read some of Len's Falconer headlines when we would lose one of our Brothers. Usually the headline would start out "Association loses a Stalwart. I grabbed a September 1998 issue and saw that we lost Rev. Fernan J. Brennan, OSFS, '32 and J. William "Bill" Arnoldy, '38 and Len would give them a glowing write up, that I am sure would have made them proud.

I am going to tell you about Len's career with North, not his career as a Battalion Chief in the PFD or as the Executive Vice President and CFO of the Police and Fire Medical Association. Maybe in another issue we will tackle those careers, hope it makes Len Proud.

I don't know how Len was raised by his parents or how the Sisters taught him at Port Richmond's St. Anne's parish. What I do know, pretty much, is how the Oblates of St. Francis de Sales educated him at his beloved Northeast Catholic. I know that they taught him to love God, enjoy learning and lead a civic minded give back to the community type of life. communities were as lucky to have a Len Knobbs in their life as anyone in need of rescue during a fire emergency and the Northeast Catholic Alumni Association and the North Catholic society in general.

Len was able to, with a lot of help from his wife Barbara, raise a large family. Barbara and Len's children referred to Northeast Catholic Alumni Association as Len's "8th" child. Some folks say that they believe Len was born with the ability to walk and talk, which developed into a "walk and yell" ability when necessary. I've heard it said that human nature is to ask why and how, Len had this trait and maxed it out.

He was always interested in learning whether there was a better way to raise funds for the scholarship program or getting the best postage rates or better prices for ink cartridges. His eye was always looking to help increase the alumni membership. I've witnessed Len in an agitated state and found that he was in this condition because a deposit or checking account was out of balance by a small amount, maybe 10 cents or \$5.00. Len didn't have the regular phobias that 10% of us have like he wasn't suffering from Ailurophobia (fear of cats) or Peladophobia (fear of bald people). His phobia was making a calculation or misstep that would hurt the Association. St Francis's famous line that a lot of us use as a motto, "Be who you are and be that well" was one that Len took to the tenth degree.

I heard a line from a song and it goes like this, "just because you're going forward doesn't mean I'm going backwards". This is a line Len would have loved to use. I always wanted the chance to use it in his presence when he was explaining to me the subtleties of one of our programs and I needed extra tutoring. I know he would have loved to lay it on me.

As proof of Len's insatiable yearning for learning, I once said to him something we've all heard, "Sooner or later even a blind squirrel finds a nut". Then I added "wonder who paid for the scientific study to find this out?" Len laughed and immediately told me who.

Len was always fond and hungry for a challenge whether it was a problem with something personal or an injustice towards NC or a new plan for the Alumni Association. The past would flare up or the demands of a future issue would be tackled and bested by him. Len was fearless and he was a part of the Association for 60 years, outstanding years. He served as President on numerous occasions in different decades. He was also our longtime Executive Secretary and Treasurer since 1970. Now these are just titles, Len was, to put it simply, our "chief cook and bottle washer". He gladly and sometimes not so happily took every task that presented itself to us and made it Len lent his talents, dedication and hard work to 19 Presidents of the Association and sad to say only a year and a half of my reign. I always looked to certain past presidents for guidance but especially Len. He always gave it to you straight, whether you liked it or not. He was a walking historian and could remember every Brother that became a Priest or who paid their dues or who did this or that, for or against North, or what year someone graduated. He knew about every athletic championship or loss. Len was a part of the Lucky program, the Memorial Scholarships Program, the Sports Raffle, Editor of the Falconer newsletter, the Communion Breakfast, the Board Dinner Meetings, Memorial Day Event and these are just the latest activities. Back in the past the Association was involved Basketball Tournaments, Dances, Black Tie Balls, picnics and Christmas parties and a bunch

of things I don't even know about. Funny I can remember being taught about "Manifest Destiny" but I cannot remember by who, The Sisters of St. Joseph or the Oblates at North, or probably both, but I remember it meaning the special virtues of the American people and this mission of the US to redeem and remake the West in the image of the agrarian East and the irresistible duty to accomplish this. Len suffered the "Manifest Destiny" of Northeast Catholic High School for all of the North Catholic community and we owe him our gratitude, thanks and prayers for this mission he undertook in his life.

I am going to miss my friend! God Bless You!

uring the past Christmas season the angel of death was busy visiting our Oblate - North Catholic - communities.

At Childs, we lost Fr. Leon Bonikowski before Christmas. Leon was a Bridesburg boy - St John Cantius - who graduated from North in 1954. With a brief stay at Salesian, the Oblate high school in Detroit, Leon spent most of this teaching years at Fr. Judge in Philadelphia. His real dedication was to our missions. Leon spent 20 years in our missions in Brazil. When he returned to the states, he became our assistant Mission Procurator. For many years he visited parishes and schools throughout the USA preaching and collecting money for our missions in South Africa and South America. He was a man who never spoke an unkind word to anyone.

The Oblates lost Brother Fred Chiappone who lived to be 101 years old. Brother taught Chemistry at North from 1955-60 and again from 1961 to 1964. When the Oblates separated into two provinces, Fred went to the Toledo-Detroit province and taught at Bishop Duffy in Niagara Falls New York. Niagara Falls was Fred's birthplace. For years he worked at a summer camp for mentally challenged children. He was simply a fine, gentle man.

We also gave back to the Lord, "Wizard", grand our Fitzsimmons. Bob graduated from NC in 1953 and came back to his alma mater in 1959 to teach in the Business Department. Fitz's career spanned 50+ years at North. What a great Falcon he was - whether teaching Business or coordinating our annual Career Day or cutting grass and taking care of the property around the school. Fitz was truly a Salesian gentleman - making little things truly great for the Lord!

Many of us will remember Mrs. Figaniak. Jackie, as I called her, worked in the Discipline office for Mr. Koschineg. She came to North in 1987 and fell in love with the place and she stayed with us until 2010 when the archdiocese decided to close and sell the school. What a wonderful lady! She loved all her NC boys, especially those who got into trouble.

You've heard of the expression "Dutch Uncle". Well, she would be our "Dutch Aunt"!

Len Knobbs got involved with the Alumni Association upon his graduation from North in 1953. Ever since then he had been an active and dedicated member of the association. Len passed away this past December 17th, a day after his son, Robert, also passed away. What a hard burden for their family!

Thinking of Len brings to my mind the words of a song the Irish composer James Coulter wrote on the death of this father. One of the lines goes like this: "We'd thought he'd live forever. He seemed so alive and strong. But the minutes fly and the years go bye". Isn't that the truth! The name Len Knobbs and the North Catholic Alumni Association were so closely connected for almost 70 years! Len was our faithful Falcon.

Being faithful and committed to a group or a task is not an easy thing to do. If a person wishes to be faithful, one must be ready to put aside one's time and comforts and interests. This was Len's gift to the Association - his faithfulness! And this fidelity went beyond the Association - to his family, his church and his country.

Well, he's gone from us. And, as I said, we'd thought he'd be around forever. I'll miss him. I'll miss his bi-monthly phone calls now that I'm retired at Childs. I'll miss his and his wife, Barbara's visits. I'll never forget my surprise Golden Jubilee Dinner which the members gave me, and, which I know, he had a hand in.

The words of Coulter's song have a special meaning for me: "And tho' he may be gone, memories will linger on. And I'll miss him - the old man".

To Len and the other North Catholic faithful who have passed away, I offer this beautiful insight of St. Francis de Sales found in The Introduction to the Devout Life (Part 1, 17).

"From the heights of Heaven, Jesus mercifully looks down upon you and graciously invites you there. He says: "Come, dear soul, find everlasting rest in my bountiful arms where I have prepared undying happiness for you in the abundance of My love".




COMMUNION BREAKFAST CANCELED ONCE AGAIN

SAVE THE DATE CLASS OF 1966!!



I have wanted to write this article for over ten years. I guess now is as good a time as any! Over the years since our beloved Alma Mater closed, the Alumni has kept our legacy and its entities going strong. The phrase I have seen printed on many NC shirts, "Gone But Not Forgotten", really is true. However, let me explain why the green shrub in the photo at the top means the same for me.
